Happy 30th Anniversary

Praise and glory to our Lord Jesus Christ through whom we find life and have it to the fullest as He blesses us with His great joy and peace. Indeed our Lord is worthy to be praised and we are reminded of this as we celebrate thirty years of His presence in the midst of the CCCV community.

2014 is our 30th anniversary. It is a celebration of God's goodness and faithfulness for the past thirty years. I celebrate with the founders and the founding pastor Rev. Joshua Mak as well as all the members, leaders and pastors who have put their trust in God and seen Him provide faithfully all these years. It is also a time for us all to gather together, in thanksgiving as well as in prayer, as we pledge our faith in God and look to Him for guidance and direction in the years to come. As much as it is about what God has done for us in the past, we must remember that our God is not only the God of the past and present, He is also the God of the future. Thus may I lead CCCV to whole-heartedly seek God in the midst of all our celebrations so that we will set our hearts to walk together, united as one body, along the path God has planned for us, from 2014 until Christ comes again.

From its beginnings as a traditional ethnic Chinese Cantonese speaking church located in the city, CCCV has moved on to owning its own property in Nunawading. After renting facilities at Loyal Orange House and the beautiful Anglican church building at Wynnstay Road, Armadale, prayers were answered when we purchased the buildings at our current location. While we give thanks for the provision of the property, we are also in awe of God's wisdom as he placed us centrally within an extended area where a large population of Asians live. Most wonderfully, there is a growing young population settling in the suburbs from Boxhill to Ringwood along the Eastern corridor. To the original Cantonese speaking congregation is added a vibrant English speaking congregation of more than one hundred worshippers. The most recent addition to CCCV is the Mandarin congregation. Each Sunday, four separate services at different times cater to the different language needs. In addition, numerous ministries targeting different groups run throughout the week.

The 30th anniversary is also a good time to mark the transition of leadership from the founding generation of members to the younger generation comprising of their children and

new blood. Out from the younger generation, we celebrate CCCV's first home-grown intern pastor. As intern pastor, Jonathan Wong continues to prepare himself by developing a strong evangelical theological foundation through his studies at the Melbourne School of Theology. Hands-on learning comes from his involvement in the running of LifeSpring, particularly the youth and focus on the young adults. We look forward to his leadership full time upon his graduation. We are thankful to God that He has kept the different generations together and provided for succession in the church.

In order to follow God's heartbeat for the lost, CCCV's mission committee was formed in 2004 to develop a missions and outreach program for the church. Work on the church's mission policy paper begun and soon after, a church wide mission conference was held on the premises in Armadale. As many as twenty organisations took part with morning services dedicated to missions. Mission speakers preached, as well as conducted afternoon seminars. Unknown to us back then, it was the wonderful start to exciting events in the years to come.

While the younger members were encouraged to take part annually in outreach and mission activities such as Beach Mission and short term missions, it was in 2009 that CCCV's inhouse organised mission trip took place. A total of thirty three members from both Cantonese and LifeSpring congregations took part as three teams. Each team had a separate itinerary and mission program. The ministry partners in Thailand were Ps. Daniel Loo, Gateway ministry and John and Denise Dickson. Since then teams have returned to Thailand twice, in 2011 and 2013, as well as to China in 2012. Other members have joined mission organisations to serve in overseas cross-cultural ministry ranging from 6weeks to a year. Carmen (China), Lauren (Indonesia), Candy (Kyrgyzstan) and Enoch (Turkey) were some of those who went overseas.

On the local front, much effort has been put into reaching out to the local community. Door knocks, Christmas events, as well as day trips to Bendigo took place. In 2013, CCCV was instrumental in initiating the Victoria wide Activate Missions Resource Conference, with many of our church members helping in the organisation and running of the events. We continue to ask God to place in our hearts the great desire to reach out with His Gospel of salvation, so that as salt and light, CCCV will shine bright and lead many into the safe waters of our Saviour's love.

It is our hope that CCCV will continue to actively and intentionally disciple our members, teaching them to faithfully submit themselves, as living sacrifices to the Lord, as their act of

worship and moving them towards complete obedience to the One Almighty God. Thus we remind ourselves with CCCV's mission statement;

CCCV is a community of believers who love God and are passionate about making disciples for Christ in our generation.

2013 Report from the Deacons Board

Leadership Team

- ➤ Pastoral Search Committee was set up in January to seek a suitable Minister to replace Rev Lim who left in July. There were four applicants and a couple of recommendations since the position was advertised in May. After careful assessment, they did not satisfy the prerequisites of CCCV. The Committee continues to look for a suitable Minister through various avenues.
- ➤ Maxi Kwan decided not to renominate as deacon upon expiry of his term. On behalf of the church, the Board would like to express our appreciation for his faithful service.
- > Simon Pang, Irwin Hau, Jane Chiu, Alex Goh, Ida Lau, Anissia Keung and Patrick Poon continued their term for another year. Timmy Ngai was elected as a new Deacon.
- > The Deacons Board agreed that Rev Lok will get involved more in the pastoral care of the Chinese Congregation. Jonathan Wong and Catherine Lok will take up additional responsibilities in LifeSpring to relieve Rev Lok.
- ➤ The Pastoral Team was established in April. Its responsibilities include: setting the vision and direction of the Church, monitoring the spiritual growth of the members and discipleship. The team members are Rev Patrick Lok, Jonathan Wong, Alex Wong, Simon Pang, Timmy Ngai and Patrick Poon. Rev Joshua Mak was invited to be the Advisor.
- ➤ The Pastoral Team has reviewed and developed a revised Vision and Mission of CCCV for the next three years: Build, Engage, Serve. Rev. Lok shared with the leaders of LifeSpring, Cantonese and Mandarin congregations about the Church Vision and Directions and obtained valuable feedbacks.

Ministries

Chinese Congregation

- ➤ As of February, a special prayer meeting is held in the morning of the third Saturday of every month. Apart from praying for God's provision of a suitable Minister, we also pray for the leaders, church ministries and members. In October and November, members were encouraged to have a day of prayer and fasting once a week for these items.
- ➤ A "Parenting" forum was organised on two Sundays in April. Thirty people attended with a very positive response.
- ➤ In July, the Sunday School started a special session called "Theology and Daily Life" on the second Sunday of each month.
- ➤ In August, two baptism classes were conducted by Pastor Marke Leong for Cantonese and Dr. Bill Wu for Mandarin respectively and two members were baptized in November.

- ➤ Rev. Lok conducted a sharing session on "Christians' Response to Homosexuality" in September. The materials were based on the same topic given by Dr Jason Ong to LifeSpring in July. The main focus was to clarify the position of our Church in relation to homosexuality and how we, as Christians, deal with people with such behaviour based on teachings from the Bible.
- > A combined Thanksgiving dinner was held at Church on 14th December. The turnout was good and the participants enjoyed the program and sharing.
- ➤ A couple of working bee days were organised by the Property Management Team. A big thank you for those who participated.

LifeSpring

- > The LifeSpring camp was held on 1st-3rd March. The Theme was "How to be a 21st century Christian".
- > Dr Jason Ong was invited to give a talk on "A Christian's response to Homosexuality" in July.
- > A special talk on "Science and Faith" was conducted by Alex Wong in August.
- ➤ A pre-marital counselling course conducted by Rev Lok commenced in November with 3 couples.
- > There were 6 children who participated in the Infant Dedication service held on 1st December.

Outreach & Mission

- ➤ A combined outreach activity by LifeSpring and the Chinese Congregation of delivering Christmas gifts to our neighbors was well received in general.
- ➤ One member went on a mission trip to Kyrgyzstan for 2 months.
- ➤ 6 young people joined Student Life Beach Mission in November.
- > A Car Boot Sale/Bake Sale to raise funds for Thailand Missions was held in November.
- ➤ 19 people went on a short term mission trip to Phrao in December. The trip was organized by Gospel Operation International (GOI). They worked with a team of 10 people from Sydney.
- > A small team of 5 went on a "Mission Awareness Trip" organized by the Mission Committee.

Growing Old with CCCV

Indeed I thank God for bringing me into this community when CCCV had just celebrated its 15^{th} anniversary and now allowing me to celebrate CCCV's 30^{th} anniversary with families and friends who have journeyed with our family for the last fifteen years.

Seeing God's hand upon the twenty or so young people whom we met while they were in high school or university brings great joy to my heart. As our family participates in CCCV's ministry in LifeSpring, these young people have grown and many have gone on to be married couples and even parents of a couple of kids. Today LifeSpring is blessed with a maturing community both in terms of their age as well as their knowledge of God and their Christian walk with God. Growth comes with differing needs. As such, besides having teams taking care of the Sunday service, we have developed ministries for different groups in the church. Numbered amongst these are: Junior church for primary school children, Remix for high schoolers, LifeGroups for university students and young adults.

For the past year and a half, a young parents life group was formed to meet the needs of the growing number of young parents in the congregation. Adding 'tools' to their parenting toolbox to develop healthy, God centred families was the goal of our ministry (Deuteronomy 6: 6-8). In a relaxed atmosphere which sometimes can be chaotic with 6 toddlers and a few babies, the young parents come together to fellowship over God's Word, encouraging and learning from each other's personal experiences. Many have enjoyed coming to these meetings for the friendship and common bond in Christ in this particular season in their lives.

By the time this anniversary booklet is printed, LifeSpring would have launched another new ministry based on Titus 2:3-5. *Cherished* - launched on the 10th May 2014, is a ministry created uniquely for women only. As older women are called to model faith and mentor younger women, *Cherished* is a platform for the different generations of women at LifeSpring to interact, fellowship and get to know each other better. Building upon relationships, young women and older women are encouraged to seek assistance and spiritual insight from each other, so that eventually every woman at LifeSpring will be both a disciple and a discipler. Events are planned with the aim of growing our relationship with

God and others, developing our spiritual gifting for use in God's kingdom and living a Godly life.

Please pray with us that CCCV will continue to grow by doing God's work in God's strength so that many will be drawn into the kingdom, seeing our good deeds and praising our Father in heaven.

I want to share something I have experienced in the last few months. Our God is the God who provides whatever you need; our God is the God who knows you the most, our God is the God who loves you more than yourself.

I graduated in 2012 in Melbourne, and have been looking for a job for ages. I have been waiting, and praying for a year without any success. Finally in August 2013, I received an invitation for a Skype interview with a company in Hong Kong. I was in great joy, but one consideration is that I cannot report for work until January 2014 because I have already decided to join the short term mission team in December 2013. At that time I was wondering whether I should tell them about my mission trip to Thailand. What if they did not want to have an interview with me anymore? And I told myself, if God really wants to give me a job, it will be mine so I put things in God's hands. I replied that I can make the Skype interview, but I could not go to Hong Kong until January expecting them not to want to interview me anymore.

However, their reply to me was if I came back in September, they can offer me the job. The job was exciting and related to my field of study and I was really in a great struggle. After a year of waiting, finally there was a job offer. Should I take that job or should I continue my short term mission trip? I wanted to trust God and felt that if this job is what God really wants for me, I will definitely get it. So I replied the company that I wanted to continue with my short term mission trip and asked if they would wait for me. This is how they replied me, "...as our plant commissioning will be in late September / early October, we need staff reporting duty on/before early October so we cannot wait for you. Sorry and if we have vacancy in the future, I will let you know. Thanks...". This was what I expected, I know in my mind God will provide me a job, but I still felt sad, really sad. I know He loves me, but is that what I really trust?

Life goes on, after a really successful short term mission trip in Thailand, and a wonderful holiday in Melbourne, I went back to Hong Kong in January. I contacted the company again to ask if I could have another interview with them. I did not expect them to organize another interview for me, but they actually did. I was in great joy, I praised God and gave thanks. At the interview, the first thing the manager said was "I remembered you; you rejected the job offer before because of a short term mission trip." Then he asked me many really basic technical questions which I couldn't answer. After the interview, I felt hopeless, disappointed and sad, I did blame God because I felt like I could not see His plan and did not know if He wanted me to have a job or not. I lost my faith a bit but life still goes on, and I

still needed to look for a job, and there were not many jobs related to what I have studied available on the market. I did not know what to do and I did not know what my future will be. I know God will look after me, I know He loves me, I know my future is in His hands. I know everything in my head but not what I really trust. I was afraid, it felt pointless, I did not know what my future would be.

In the midst of all this, I received a job offer from the company. Unbelievable! How amazing was that, everything is in His hands, right? I am such a man of little faith, "you of little faith, always afraid" (Matthew. 8:26). This is not the end yet. On my first day at work, I met with the production manager in his room, just the two of us. He asked me which church did I go to and he said the only reason that he chose me was because I am a brother in Christ. He remembered I did reject the interview because of Thailand missions. At that point I surely knew, this is the job God wants me to do. God is always faithful, but I am the one with little faith, I did not fully trust God is with me and looking after me all the time. When I was frustrated, down, tired of looking for jobs and wanted to give up, God was moving in a way I couldn't see and do not know and thought that I am was alone. He is always faithful, but I am of little faith. I was so touched when he said he chose me because I am Christian.

After two weeks of work, I began to know this company is not that great and is always experiencing some failure, faulty and emergency situation. This thought always comes to my mind, "quit this job, get a new one". When I received another job interview from a bigger, more popular company, I really wanted to quit this job. However I am not going for that opportunity, not because I do not want to work in a bigger company or have a better career path or that I am happy with the current company but simply because they chose me. I knew that they had chosen me not because of my ability but because I am a Christian. I struggled a bit when I received the other interview email as a better career path with more money is really tempting. But for now, I just want to be a living testimony for God in the place where He has brought me to. I will stay and work in this company.

I hope what I have experienced will help you in your Christian walk, be an encouragement for you to live out your faith. Do not stay in the stage of just knowing everything, but live out what you know. Everything happens because God wants you to learn something from it or God wants you to see your own weakness. We are humans of little faith but our God is always faithful.

It Has Been 30 Years

It has been thirty years since CCCV was formally established, so is my spiritual age. When I look back over these thirty years, I cannot help asking myself where am I heading to and what have I done for God?

On the eve of Easter 1984, one of my classmates introduced Christ to me. The Holy Spirit opened my heart and challenged me that if Christ had lived, died and resurrected, what would you choose? Accept or reject Him. I found that there was actually only one choice. As a result, I accepted Christ as my personal saviour. I then started to join the service at CCCV and the Youth Group. I strongly believe that God had His plan for me when He led me to Australia to study. The most important reason would be to know Him. Secondly, the Youth Group provided me with a strong foundation for my faith, which has kept me serving the Lord for thirty years.

As I was organising the thirtieth anniversary camp, I had a chance to look through a lot of the old photographs of our church, from the very beginning until today. That brought back a lot of memories and I also found that our second generation was springing up fast and they were also having their next generation. Praise the Lord!

What is ahead for CCCV? I do not have a clear vision. However, this reminds me of the book of Deuteronomy where Moses reiterated how the Israelites were brought out of Egypt, a place of slavery, for God had promised them the land of milk and honey. God did that because He had chosen the Israelites to be His witnesses among all the nations. Therefore, Moses proclaimed to the new generation of Israelites all the commandments and laws concerning them on the eve of entering the promised land, so that they would live a life the Lord had commanded them. Should we be reminded about the purpose of our lives on Earth?

As we know, people are forgetful. In the book of Judges, where it says that the people (Israelites) served the Lord throughout the lifetime of Joshua and of the elders who outlived

him and who had seen all the great things the Lord had done for them. After the passing of that whole generation, another generation grew up, who knew neither the Lord nor what He had done for Israel. Then the Israelites did evil in the eyes of the Lord and served the Baals. As the Israelites continued to serve the idols and not their God, they lost the honour of being the chosen people who were to bear witness of God. Their country was taken over by another country and they were taken as captives to Babylon. When the time of exile was up, God raised people like Ezra and Nehemiah who led some of the Israelites back to their homeland and rebuilt Jerusalem. However, not all the Israelites went back. The life of exile was not as bad as people thoughts especially for the new generations as Babylon was a grand and rich city. Many of them were quite comfortable living in Babylon and had no intention of going back to ruins.

My spiritual life shows some resemblance to the history of Israel. After accepting Christ, it was like being taken out of Egypt to be free from the slavery of sin. However, further training in faith is required. The desert is usually linked to hardship and deprivation; however, God's work and grace are obvious. I thank God that the Youth Group of CCCV had helped me to lay a sound foundation for my Christian faith. There were a group of spiritually more mature young Christians who were willing to sacrifice their time to conduct follow-ups and discipleship training while they were also very busy with their studies. A lot of the brothers and sisters during my time are now serving as pillars of their churches in different places.

When I finished my studies in Australia, I went back home. It seemed that I had gone into Canaan. One thing the Israelites did not do when they entered Canaan was that they did not eradicate all the local people and their idols. They followed the local people and worshipped their idols. Hong Kong is a good place, but is also full of temptation. It is not easy to follow the Lord whole-heartedly. It also makes things harder as my parents are not Christians. It is by God's grace that I was able to hold on to my ground. After having my own family, the crisis deepened as my children, my wife and I were living with my parents. It was so hard to take them to church on Sundays, let alone to talking about using God's Word to teach them. Therefore, I decided to migrate to Australia with the hope of giving my wife and my children the right environment for their spiritual growth.

Although migrating to Melbourne is not comparable to the Babylonian Exile, life in the lucky country makes people complacent just like the new generations of Israelites living in Babylon. Timothy while we are in Melbourne. We are able to go to church to worship God consistently and to have cell group. The children are learning about God at church.

In the process of organising this year's church camp and through the recap of the history of CCCV, God has reminded me about His deeds and grace, and spoken to me that I should do more for Him. The Pursuit Of Excellence

Introduction

A story tells that a little boy named Kong Rong was given a bigger pear to eat. He could have eaten the pear but he would rather let his elder brother eat it. People naturally want to get the best things for themselves. Vincent T. Lumbardi says, "The quality of people's life is in direct proportion to their commitment to excellence, regardless of their chosen field of endeavour." An unknown author also says, "Excellence is best described as doing the right things right---- selecting the most important things to be done and then accomplishing them 100 percent correctly." It is clear then that people would like to lead a quality life, enjoying all the best things, and not to have a poor or insecure life. However, if a person just pursues one or two areas of excellence but neglects or refuses to pursue the other things supposed to be excellent, this person is then not doing all the right things right. So it is not good enough to pursue just one or two, or even three, areas of excellence. What are those areas of excellence then? Out of many areas there are at least five which are more important, in the range of career, comfort, health, relationship and faith. People should try hard to pursue all of them with equal effort and emphases. This essay is written to assess people's intentions and efforts to pursue these areas of excellence and to sort out their strengths and weaknesses as they pursue these.

I. Being Successful in Career

This is the first area of excellence that most people are very keen to pursue, and many of them perform extremely well in their pursuit. The success of their performance is usually measured by how much money each of them earns and accumulates, and if this person has also acquired academic awards it would even be more successful for him or her. Consider the following two reports. The first one tells of an entrepreneur called Wang Hua who is China's 79th richest person, and he flew to Melbourne on his personal jet to buy a property. He has a net worth of A\$400 million. He spent at least A\$20 million to buy a sprawling Toorak estate, which is huge and has many modern amenities. (Note that the richest Chinese person has a personal wealth of Renminbi \$86,000,000,000. Note also that in February 2014 it was also reported in the newspapers that 1.1 million such rich Chinese people will invest their money in Melbourne and elsewhere to buy properties and businesses.) In China nowadays even an ordinary person can become successful in his or her

career. Tao Huabi became very rich by producing a chilli sauce. Her enterprise employs 2,000 workers. The annual sales of this product is R\$2,500,000,000.

The above two reports are indeed amazing to read; yet there are also bad consequences. The rich dramatist Arthur Miller in the 1940s pointed out that the "guilt of success" feeling in a successful person will appear as money continuously flows into his or her pocket, making him or her lack or lose enthusiasm or interest to work and to do other things. Later on this person will even stop pursuing other areas of excellence, for his or her attention has been drawn to the creation of more money. Luckily Mr Miller soon got rid of his "guilty" feeling and re-started his writing career (Sing Tao Daily,19 November 2013). "There is nothing wrong with people possessing riches. The wrong comes when riches possess people," Billy Graham points out. Think also of what Jesus says to those rich people pursuing mainly one or two areas of excellence: "A man's life does not consist in the abundance of his possessions" (Luke 12:15). Jesus also teaches: Do not let money control a person and make him or her forfeit his or her own life (Luke 9:25).

II. Leading a Comfortable Life

People do eagerly want to pursue this second area of excellence which is to lead a comfortable life. Many of them can get what they want, and they think that leading a life in luxury will surely make them feel more comfortable. They would probably like to live in a big house, drive an expensive car, eat delicate food, and wear fine clothes. However, a person leading a modest or simple life can also lead a comfortable life as long as that person is satisfied with what he or she has and is not demanding. It is because money and goods do not necessarily entail a comfortable life.

A comfortable life is very much sought after by many people but it is not guaranteed that they can always get it. The good days cannot always be with them, for people may sometimes get entangled in harsh circumstances. People will then have to forfeit their preferred life-style. Perhaps there could be something wrong in the process of pursuing a desired comfortable life. They should then listen to what Moses said to the Israelites:

"When you have eaten your fill and have built fine houses and live in them.... do not exalt yourself, forgetting the Lord your God....

Do not say to yourself, 'My power and the might of my own hand have gotten me this wealth.' But remember the Lord your God,

for it is he who gives you power to get wealth, so that he may confirm his covenant...."(Deuteronomy 8:12-14, 17-18 NRSV)

It is a very valuable lesson for all people, Israelites and other people, to learn. The Israelites forsook God; other people could just overestimate their abilities. It is God who is in control of things and he deserves people's honour and trust for him.

III. Possessing Good Health

Many people know the importance of having good health, and they would make an effort to get it. "He who enjoys good health is rich though he knows it not," an Italian proverb says. Health therefore is as precious as money or gold. Many people then keep fit by eating and resting well, and by exercising through walking, running, swimming or cycling. A columnist reported on 8 January 2012 that a certain man was exercising in a Hong Kong TV show about ageing. This man looked pretty young, like a 50-year-old fellow. In fact he was already 70, as revealed by the programme host. This "young fellow" admitted that he exercised regularly, not just doing a morning walk but also lifting dumbbells too. Yet there are also lazy people who do not exercise, and they may even develop some bad habits such as smoking and heavy drinking. Besides good physical health, sound mental health is also important. That "young fellow" mentioned above looked optimistic and relaxed too.

Another problem which many people may have is that they tend to be choosy in their daily living. They prefer one thing to another without caring about the consequence. For example, they may either eat too much meat and dairy food, or consume only a small quantity or portion of vegetables and fruit. It should be noted that a balanced diet should include milk, cereals (particularly oats), meat and/or fish, vegetables (such as spinach, broccoli, tomatoes, and carrots) and fruit (all kinds) including nuts and dates. An adequate or suitable consumption of food will definitely give a person good health. Moreover a person with a healthy body and a pure heart or spirit will be indwelt by God's spirit, and certainly such a person can please God (See 1 Corinthian 6:19-20). Generally this area of excellence has not been pursued in the best manner by many people.

IV. Developing a Good Relationship

This is an area of excellence which many people perform quite disappointingly in their pursuit. Humans are gregarious or social living beings, so they live together and do things together. "The easiest kind of relationship for me is with ten thousand people. The hardest

is with one," says Joan Baez. This means that it is hard to deal with an individual such as his or her spouse, or parent, or sibling, or boss (even himself or herself). But most people still wish to establish a good relationship with any of them, and want to do it to their best. In reality many people simply cannot achieve this goal, and consequently they suffer as quarrels and disputes very often flare up at home and in the work-place. Sad to say, loved ones become the hated ones, or even enemies. The following two newspaper reports tell what pain people have to bear when their relationship with other people are mucked up.

Lang Hancock was a mining magnate. After his death his daughter Gina Rinehart became Australia's richest person. She was first married to Greg Milton but the marriage ended eight years later (1973-81). Their children are John and Bianca. Now John Hancock (or rather Milton) accuses his mother Gina Rinehart of acting deceitfully or dishonestly and that she wants to control the family fortune. So John wants to remove his mother as trustee of the multi-billion dollar mining fortune. Fighting back Mrs Rinehart says that her warring children are not suitable to run the trust. However, her first husband Greg Milton points out that she (Gina) either hates him or she favours her second set of children fathered by Frank Rinehart. The court case was to be heard on 1 October 2013 (The Age, 14 September 2013). The next report is similar to the above one. Bob Jane (trade mark: Bob Jane---T-Mart) the tyre tycoon is fighting with his son Rodney who is accused of stealing the family riches. To make things simple, perhaps Bob's stroke has made him unable to handle his wealth properly. He has had three marriage breakdowns (The Age Good Weekend, 24 August 2013). People must not blame the above two families and their family members. Many people nowadays are more or less like them. Tolerance, forgiveness, openness and love are essential for good relationship to be developed but unfortunately these are sometimes lacking.

V. Having Faith in All Matters

This is the area of excellence which many people do not notice, or do not wish to pursue. It is true that there are many things which people may not know or understand. Anson Cameron writes that many people do not know how things such as TV, quantum physics, a microchip, a jet engine, and others, work, and yet he says he boards a 767 plane in faith (The Age, 7 July 2013). Mr Cameron does not believe in God, for he says, "I don't have a god," and he hates people using "God wishes" to deal with things or matters (The Age,16 March 2014). Yet he chooses to use faith in things he cannot grasp. Mikael Krogerus and Roman Tschappeler also write: "We are increasingly surrounded by 'black boxes', complex constructs, that we do not understand even if they are explained to usbut none the less we integrate their inputs and outputs into our decision-making.... and we simply have to believe" (The Decision Book, p.118). These two authors also suggest the use of faith when

dealing with business ventures, and where decisions have to be made promptly with minimum information (p.34). It is not clear whether these two authors use faith from a Christian perspective or not.

Besides secular matters mentioned above there are also spiritual matters, which are even harder to understand. Consider these spiritual matters in the Christian belief God's creation of things and human beings, destruction of the world by flood, drying up of the Red Sea, and covenants made between God and His people, as recorded in the Old Testament of the Bible. In the New Testament of the same book, spiritual matters such as the virgin birth of Christ, His death to redeem sinners, His resurrection from death, believers to inherit eternal life, are also hard to understand. People will need faith to understand all these matters. Augustine of Hippo points out, "Do not seek to understand in order you may believe, but believe so that you may understand." So people need to have faith in things as well as in God. If people know God and believe in him, then they will probably not lack faith. Yet these people must first need to humble themselves and to overcome their limitations.

Final Thoughts

It can be seen that some areas of excellence are comparatively easy to pursue while the others are not. Because money and goods are not hard to get, the needs of the flesh can easily be satisfied. However the needs of a person's mind or heart will mostly seem not easy to satisfy. It is because a person has to deal with people, and complicated social issues, and that is the difficult part. Many problems will arise and these are usually hard to solve too. Could it be due to spoilt human nature? Regarding the spiritual matters which many people do not know much about, the needs of the soul or spirit in a person would seem even harder to satisfy. Even so, if a person has faith, faith in secular matters and faith in spiritual matters, surely this person will see good outcomes and will also be able to experience God's wonders and beauty as he or she lives. Then God's fulfilment of His promises and the accomplishment of Jesus' redemption work, to name just two, could move this person, making him marvel at these all the time.

Since the position is a life-long appointment, the board has to consider it very carefully and seriously. Since this suggestion has been raised, it will be put into the board agenda for discussion.

Q: Henry Hui

- 1. Why raised this question at this point of time or it has been considered for a long time. Will it be unfair to the new pastor if an elder was appointed before his employment?
- 2. What are the shortcomings? What authority or power does an elder have? Who makes the final decision?

A: Patrick Poon

This is why the board has been considering this very carefully. The authority of an elder was clearly written in CCCV 's Constitutions which will be revised this year. The board will take this matter very seriously. The process of appointing an elder will take a certain period of time and will not be done in a rush.

K H Wong (who was appointed as an elder in his own church in HK) was invited by Connie Wong to give a briefing about the role of an elder. K H Wong agreed it should be considered carefully given its nature of the position and take time for members to digest the idea. There should be a team of elders instead of just one and ideally 3 in the team.
